





Neighbouring woodland either side of Grandtully is BL, and Grandtully helps in the habitat links along River Tay

Car park and path to stunning Castle Dow viewpoint are well used locally. Path is a slog up the forest road and could be improved by rerouting. However woodland in between is designated Natural Reserve.

Middle section of Grandtully is currently CCF, but there is 10-20% Larch mixed in, which will need removing as soon as possible due to the proximity of the neighbouring SPHN.

View from Castle Dow to be kept open

Removal of Larch may make the quarry visible within the general landscape

Fencing along boundary is poor, allowing deer to move between the woodlands. Establishing restocking may be inhibited.

Although the edges of the forest may not be seen from many places, it is prudent to review them, as their current abrupt, straight edge does not sit comfortably in the landscape.

Trees on the other side of the burn may be difficult to access. Current restocking proposals suggest productive conifer, but the riparian zone and difficulty of access may favour BL's

Kinnaird Estate planting reflects FLS planting. Future restocking will need to take this into account

Burns will inhibit access to these areas, and the area NE of Craig Craiggan is still 900+m from the proposed new road

Management for Craig Craiggan needs to be considered for softer transition between trees and moor


